

GANGS



GANGS ARE NOT A PROBLEM ONLY IN LARGE CITIES.

Gangs, and the violence they cause, are problems for everyone across the country.

- 32% of cities with population between 25,000 and 50,000 reported at least one homicide from 1999 to 2000 that was attributed to gang violence.¹
- In 1996, 50% of gang members were under the age of 18, but in 1999 only 37% of gang members were estimated to be under the age of 18.²
- In 1999 it is estimated that 47% of gang members were Hispanic, 31% were African American, 13% were white, and 7% were Asian. These percentages seem to remain fairly steady over the years.³ A gang is a group of 3 or more individuals, which possess leadership, structure, an identification system, and is involved in antisocial or criminal behavior.

WHAT IS A GANG?

A gang is a group of 3 or more individuals, which possess leadership, structure, an identification system, and is involved in antisocial or criminal behavior.

HOW CAN I SPOT IDENTIFICATION SYMBOLS?

- Graffiti/Tagging: Symbols and “unusual” letters on buildings, sidewalks, school books, book bags, and clothing. Look for symbols that show up repeatedly.
- Marking: Graffiti on the person, tattoos or other markings may match symbols found on personal items and other property. Gang members are tattooed to show allegiance to their gang.
- Clothing: Many gangs require members to dress alike, the same colors, jackets, hats, shoes, etc. Check for bandannas (rags) in a pocket or worn as an accessory. Also dressing “left” or “right” (i.e. left pant leg rolled up, left pocket with a bandanna hanging out, hat bill to the left, etc.)

COULD MY CHILD BE INVOLVED WITH A GANG?

Yes.

Gang membership crosses all boundaries of age, sex, race, academic achievement, and economic status.

WHAT SIGNS CAN I LOOK FOR IN MY CHILD?

- A change in friends or being secretive about who their friends are.
- Violent behavior.
- Refusal to obey authority and being disrespectful to authority figures.
- Drug/alcohol use and/or possession.
- Possession of weapons (knives, guns, brass knuckles).
- Sporadic school attendance and grade decline.
- Use of hand signals resembling sign language.
- Drawing gang signs or graffiti.

WHAT CAN I DO IF I SUSPECT MY CHILD IS INVOLVED WITH A GANG?

- Enforce a strict curfew and know the whereabouts of your child.
- Get to know your child's friends.
- Set an example of nonviolent reactions to situations.
- Get your child involved in extracurricular activities.
- Utilize your local resources for help and support them.
- Educate other parents and work with schools and local law enforcement agencies.
